

The Florida Music Education Association is taking a proactive stance as change occurs in our educational world. The FMEA board recognizes that change is inevitable, yet reacting to each and every technological or educational change is exhausting for our members and not always productive. The FMEA Summer Institute grew out of a challenge to envision future trends and a decision to embrace and to plan for change. FMEA convened the first Summer Institute Class in 2007 with 25 participants selected for their forwarding thinking and leadership in music education.

The Institute is a multiday training that involves a relatively small number of successful, well-respected, invited music educators.

The overarching goal of the FMEA Summer Institute is to ensure that the mission of FMEA—comprehensive, quality music education available to all—is accomplished! The FMEA Summer Music Institute is a kind of 21st century music education think tank summit. The focus is on offering instruction that attracts all students, thereby strengthening Florida's commitment to "music for all."

At the Summer Institute, participants consider the following questions:

- How do we teach with rigor and introduce new musical offerings to our students?
- How do we transform our traditional ensembles to be musically vibrant and relevant to a greater number of students and parents?
- How do we transform music education and change our perceptions to enable us to reach a broader cross section of students?

In addition to engaging sessions, there is time built in for specific directed discussion and reflection.

Participants leave the Institute with models that can increase the number of students engaged in music education courses as well as with a network to assist them throughout the year.

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

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

FMEA PRESIDENT-ELECT CANDIDATE

Shelby R. Chipman

Shelby Rawn Chipman, PhD, is professor of music at Florida A&M University (FAMU). His responsibilities in the Department of Music include teaching instrumental music education, conducting and coordinating student recitals and student teachers (as music interns). Additionally, he serves as director of the marching and pep bands, wind symphony, symphonic band and string ensemble.

He is a native of Miami, where he graduated from Miami Northwestern Senior High. He received B.S. degrees in computer science and music education from Florida A&M University, where he was a conducting student of the late Dr. William P. Foster and Dr. Julian E. White. Professor Chipman completed the MME at the University of Illinois and received the PhD in music education from the Florida State University (FSU) College of Music, where he studied with Dr. Bentley Shellahamer.

Prior to his appointment at FAMU, Dr. Chipman taught music in the Miami-Dade County Public School system for 10 years. His band program at Miami Central High School developed into one of the finest band programs in the country. Dr. Chipman was named Teacher of the Year during the 1993-94 school year. Under his leadership, the Rocket Marching Band performed in the 1993, 1995 and 1997 King Orange Jamboree Parade, 1993 Heritage Festival (New Orleans), 1990-96 FAMU Homecoming Festival (Tallahassee), 1992-97 MLK Parade & Festival (St. Petersburg), 1997 Macy's Day Parade (New York City) and numerous other marching events. The Miami Central High School Symphonic Band performed at the prestigious Bands of America National Concert Festival in Indianapolis, Indiana. During his tenure in Miami-Dade County Public Schools,



he served as district secretary, chairman, ethics, all-state and the executive board of the Florida Bandmasters Association.

Dr. Chipman is a member of Kappa Kappa Psi, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, Kappa Alpha Psi, National Association for Music Education, Florida Music Education Association, Florida Bandmasters Association, College Band Directors National Conference, FMEA Multicultural Network and Bethel AME Church (Tallahassee). He has coordinated numerous band festivals and has had the pleasure of working with James Croft, James Keene, André Thomas, Jim Sparks, Gary Green, Anthony Maiello, Alex Jiménez and Eugene Corporon. In addition to working with these outstanding conductors, Dr. Chipman has presented music education and conducting clinics on several public school and college campuses, as well as given lectures at the FMEA Professional Development Conference and the Midwest Clinic in Chicago.

He serves as the collegiate advisor of the Florida Collegiate National Association for Music Education, is the Southern Division: NAfME advisor of

13 states, is an active adjudicator and clinician throughout the southeastern United States and serves as music director/conductor of the Tallahassee Big Bend Community Orchestra. The Florida A&M University Wind Symphony and Symphonic Band perform regularly on campus during the fall and spring semesters, as well as at divisional, national and professional music conferences. Under his direction, the wind symphony has performed at the FMEA conference in Tampa, at Carnegie Hall in New York City and has been invited to perform at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C.

Dr. Chipman has published numerous articles and has completed research in the areas of instrumental conducting, at-risk student success and the student teaching experience. His dissertation focused on "A Survey of Perceptions of At-Risk Students by Florida Secondary School Band Directors." He has also published articles in the *Florida Music Director* on band director success and will be featured in the fall publication of the Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) *Band Director Marching Band Digest*.

Dr. Chipman is married to Detrick LaShawn, a fourth grade teacher at Kate Sullivan Elementary School (Tallahassee), and together they have one son, Israel Armenian Chipman, who is in his final year as a student at Leon High School in Tallahassee.

Vision Statement

My vision for FMEA is embedded in our overall mission statement, which is in alignment with NAfME's mission statement: to advance music education by encouraging the study and making of music by all. As a young, developing music educator, I experienced firsthand

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the personal joy of making music, and now I have committed my entire life to making and teaching music. I am completely aware of the important role music plays in every aspect of the culture of our great nation. While the innate, non-teachable qualities of the aesthetic experience are endowed to every human being, I know that music possesses many teachable attributes that will enhance this experience.

My vision is to commit myself to this great organization with an open mind, but with the wisdom of my experiences, network and influence, to move our great profession to a higher level of effectiveness in our local communities, the state and our great country.

I believe that all students can learn. I believe there are obstacles that create barriers, but through faith, guidance and love, anything can be accomplished. As educators, it is our responsibility to encourage students to maintain their focus. There is good in all, and we are challenged to bring out the best in students each day.

I appreciate this opportunity to share some of my vision and know that my sincere commitment will guide me in all that I do for the great Florida Music Education Association.

Steven N. Kelly

Steven N. Kelly, PhD, is a professor of music education in the College of Music at Florida State University. A native of Greensboro, North Carolina, he received bachelor's and master's degrees in music from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and the PhD in music education from the University of Kansas. Dr. Kelly taught middle school and high school band in Virginia and was on the faculties of Brevard College (N.C.) and the University of Nebraska-Omaha. He is an active clinician, adjudicator and consultant across the United States. The Florida Music Education Association selected Dr. Kelly as the 2016 Florida College Music Educator of the Year.

Dr. Kelly has published and presented papers in international and national journals, and at state, regional, national and international conferences. He has served as chairman of music education in the Southern Chapter of the College Music Society and as president of the Florida College Music Educators Association. Dr. Kelly has presented numerous presentations for the Florida Music Education Association and has represented FMEA with the Florida Department of Education's Senate Committee on K-12 Education. Dr. Kelly also served as a content assessment consultant for the Florida Race to the Top Performing Arts Assessment project and is chairman of the Trinity Catholic School (Tallahassee) Principal's Advisory Council. Additionally, Dr. Kelly is active in the Florida Bandmasters Association as an adjudicator for solo and ensemble MPAs, as well as concert and marching

Dr. Kelly is the author of the book *Teaching Music in American Society: A Social and Cultural Understanding of Music Education.* He has served on the



review board for the Journal of Research on Music Education. Additionally, Dr. Kelly has served as a guest reviewer for the Psychology of Music journal and the International Journal of Music Education. He serves on the editorial boards of the Journal of Band Research, Research Perspectives in Music Education, the Desert Skies Symposium on Research in Music Education and the Suncoast Music Education Research Symposium, and is the editor-inchief of the Florida Music Director.

Dr. Kelly has been teaching for 31 years, 19 of those at Florida State University where he teaches undergraduate and graduate music education classes, conducts the University Concert Band and coordinates the music education internship program. He has been a recipient of the University Undergraduate Teaching Award and is the director of the FSU Summer Music Camps, one of the country's oldest and largest summer music camps.

Vision Statement

It is the greatest honor to serve as a nominee for president-elect of the Florida

Music Education Association. I am excited at the prospect of representing the outstanding music educators of our state. If elected, I will represent the members of our organization to the best of my ability, recognizing our past successes while moving forward to an exciting future.



Registration Policies

- 1. All participants—directors, students, chaperones and guests—must be registered for the conference.
- 2. Only directors may register their groups or pick up registration materials if preregistered.
- 3. All participating students must be chaperoned. As required by FMEA, at least one chaperone, other than a director, is required for every ten (10) students or fraction thereof; however, FMEA policy allows for one free chaperone for every six (6) students or fraction thereof.
- 4. An additional paid chaperone may be registered for (a) each six (6) students registered or (b) for each all-state rehearsal site where registered students are performing.
- 5. If a participating student is not accompanied by the director from that student's school, then the principal from that school must furnish a letter designating the person from the school or school district who is to be in charge of that student. The letter should be addressed to the FMEA executive director, explaining the extenuating circumstances preventing the director from attending, and must be submitted with registration materials by Dec. 9, 2016. The school will be notified of approval.
- 6. Student observers are not allowed to attend the conference. If any student observers are brought to the conference, the offending school's participation in the conference may be eliminated the following year. (Student Experience participants and Tri-M students registered and participating in sessions or working for the all-state concerts are exempt from this rule.)
- 7. All school music teachers must register for the conference as FMEA directors and must be current members of FMEA. This includes directors of invited performing groups and mini-concerts and session presenters. All-state conductors from Florida schools, colleges or universities must also be FMEA members. No current music teacher may register as a chaperone.



Refund Policies

- 1. Full registration refunds are available for cancellation requests made through Dec. 15, 2016.
- 2. No registration refunds will be made for cancellations made after Dec. 15, 2016, except for emergency situations. These will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis.
- 3. Refunds must be requested in writing (email is acceptable, info@FloridaMusicEducation.org).
- 4. All requests for refunds must be received no later than Jan 31, 2017. Requests received after that date will not be processed.
- 5. All refunds will be issued after the conference is completed.
- 6. There will be no refunds for concert tickets.

Chaperone Registration

Chaperone registration is based on the following rules:

Elementary Students:

- For each elementary student registered, one free chaperone and one paid chaperone may be registered.

Emerging Leaders Sessions Jeffrey S. Kimpton, Keynote Speaker

Pragmatic Leadership: A Session for Aspiring Leaders Thursday, January 12, 2017, 4:15 pm

Leadership in the arts is changing. Senior leaders are retiring in record numbers; new leaders are turning over at a faster rate; demographics are shifting; and the nature of communication, funding, partnerships and collaborations is challenging the traditional roles and values of the institutions providing the arts and education. Who will lead, and how will they respond? What must future leaders think about? What skills, capacities and experiences will be needed? How will future leaders respond to the long-term trends over which they may have little control? Do they even know what they are? In this seminar targeted toward aspiring and emerging leaders, teams will work together to understand the pragmatic nature of leadership in the 21st century.

Looking Back to Look Forward: History's Role in Our Future

Friday, January 13, 2017, 4 pm

Everyone wants to know what the future holds. Those who work in the arts-educators, performers, administrators—are no less curious. What if the answer to that future is already known and lies in the history and events of the past? Jeffrey S. Kimpton, president of the world-famous Interlochen Center for the Arts, has taught and led through more than four decades of change in the arts and education, in K12 and higher education, in for-profit and nonprofit organizations and in private philanthropy. In this keynote presentation, Mr. Kimpton will provide a unique perspective about our past and project a fascinating look forward to a future of change and innovation that may be surprising and that requires our thought and action now for success.

Jeffrey S. Kimpton President, Interlochen Center for the Arts

Jeffrey S. Kimpton is the seventh president of Interlochen Center for the Arts, where he leads a portfolio of distinguished programs in arts education, presentations, public broadcasting and media at this internationally renowned 90-year-old arts organization. Mr. Kimpton has been the president since his appointment in 2003.

Mr. Kimpton holds the BS and MS in music education and school/arts adminis-



tration from the University of Illinois–Urbana. He taught and administered K12 music and arts programs for 16 years in Corinth, New York, Apple Valley, Minnesota, and Wichita, Kansas, taking each to regional and national distinction. He served as director of education for Yamaha Corporation for the United States for nine years before becoming a director of the Annenberg Institute at Brown University, where he led research and capacity development in public engagement around public education. Prior to assuming his Interlochen post, he was professor of music education and director of the School of Music at the University of Minnesota–Minneapolis. At Minnesota he led a significant undergraduate curriculum revision, grew enrollments in music majors and non-majors, restructured the faculty governance process and raised more than \$15 million in new scholarship endowments, especially in music education.

At Interlochen, Mr. Kimpton has led a multiyear revitalization, creating a significant programmatic, capital and financial expansion. The operating budget doubled from \$22 million to \$44 million; the endowment grew from \$25 million to \$120 million; a \$75 million, 300,000 sq. ft. expansion and renovation of the campus and its infrastructure were completed; and new programs in adult education, motion picture arts, comparative arts, singer-songwriter and fashion design were added. An award-winning technology environment was built that has expanded the global reach of broadcasting, media and constituent engagement. More than \$150 million in new funds were raised for capital improvements, program endowments and scholarships in the last decade. Interlochen was awarded the National Medal of Arts by President George Bush in 2006 for its leadership in arts education.

Mr. Kimpton has served on several national commissions on the future of the arts and education, and he is an active author, speaker, presenter and consultant with schools, universities and nonprofit arts and cultural organizations in the United States, Canada, Europe and Asia. He was a member of a unique leadership program of 100 arts leaders from around the world that studied the future sustainability in the arts and culture.

Mr. Kimpton will retire from Interlochen in June 2017 to concentrate on his consulting practice, writing and teaching.



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FMEA Student Conference Experience 2017

Criteria for Participation

- Student participants will be nominated by their music director.
- The music director must be a member in good standing of FMEA.
- Music directors must register for the FMEA Professional Development Conference before student nominations will be considered.
- All nominations will be reviewed by a selection committee.
- High school students (grades 9-12) are eligible.
- Directors may nominate up to three students per school.
- Selected students must have one parent chaperone attend all activities with them, no exceptions. Music directors are not eligible to chaperone student participants.
- All selected students and designated chaperones are required to reside at the *Holiday Inn Tampa Westshore* hotel during the conference.

All participants are required to follow a specified schedule of activities each day. The students' chaperones are required to accompany the student participants during all activities. Music directors are not permitted to chaperone the selected students.

Choral Concerts at the Straz Performing Arts Center

Registered (BADGED) conference attendees need not purchase a ticket to attend concerts. Badged attendees will be handed a ticket to enter the concert at the Straz Performing Arts Center.

Nonregistered conference/concert attendees (parents, family members, guests, etc.) may purchase tickets for any Straz concert at \$10 per ticket at the FMEA registration desk between 11 am on Friday and 10 am on Saturday. After 10 am on Saturday, all remaining tickets for Straz concerts will be sold at the Straz Performing Arts Center ONLY.

NOTE: Directors need to notify persons for whom they have already purchased a ticket. Tickets are nonrefundable.

All-State Ticket Policy

- Registered (BADGED) attendees do not require tickets to attend any all-state concert. This includes directors/members, directors' non-teaching spouses, performing all-state students, registered chaperones, collegiate student members, retired members and VIP guests that you entered as part of your conference registration.
- 2. All nonregistered (NONBADGED) attendees (parents, family members, guests, etc.) are required to purchase tickets for any all-state concert they wish to attend at \$10 per ticket.
- 3. There are no "free" or "allotted" tickets. All concert attendees must either wear their conference badge or purchase a ticket.
- 4. A director who preregisters online may reserve and prepay for all-state concert tickets for nonregistered attendees for concerts in which he or she has registered all-state students. If paid for online, these tickets will be preloaded into the director's registration package.
- 5. Directors who register on site may purchase all-state concert tickets for non-registered attendees for concerts in which he or she has registered all-state students during the on-site registration process.
- Directors with all-state students may purchase additional concert tickets for nonregistered attendees for concerts in which they have performing students at the conference on-site registration desk or a designated ticket sales location at any time.
- 7. General ticket sales for all-state concerts will begin at 11 am on Thursday at the FMEA registration desk. There is no requirement that the director or any other registered attendee be the person to purchase tickets after this time.
- 8. All ticket sales are final. There are no refunds for any concert tickets.
- 9. For entrance, ticketing and concert purposes, a concert is defined as the pair of ensembles that are performing in the same venue in a common, defined block of time. An example of a "concert" for purposes of entrance, ticketing, etc., would be the 2 pm concert on Saturday for the All-State Men's Chorus and the All-State Women's Chorus.



Florida Music Education Association Code of Conduct

Student Curfew

- 1. Curfew for students on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights is from 11 pm until 6 am. Curfew for students on Saturday night begins at 11 pm or one hour after the end of the concert and lasts until 6 am. Curfew means that students must be in their rooms and remain there during the hours stated.
- 2. Thirty (30) minutes after curfew, students not in their assigned rooms will be subject to withdrawal. If curfew is violated, members from the violator(s)' school component group will not be accepted for participation in the professional development conference the following year.

Student Conduct

- Students in hotel rooms must remain reasonably quiet at all times, both day and night. People in neighboring rooms who are not connected with the conference may be trying to sleep. Television and radio may be played only with volume at low level.
- 2. Hotel rooms are bedrooms. Under no circumstances should students visit or entertain others of the opposite sex in their hotel rooms.
- Hotel room doors should be locked at all times. Extreme care should be exercised near hotel windows, and nothing is to be thrown from windows. Students are not allowed on hotel roofs.
- Chaperones should have all rooms checked before leaving hotels so that damages, if any, can be determined immediately.
- Students are not to visit students in other hotels without the permission of a chaperone. Students are not allowed in cars except with chaperones.
- 6. No alcoholic beverage may be in students' possession at any time.
- 7. Illegal use of drugs in any form is absolutely prohibited.
- 8. Use of tobacco products in public by students is prohibited.

- 9. Students should engage in activities of a group nature only. Under no circumstances are social dates involving students allowed.
- 10. Students should wear appropriate clothing, including shoes, at all times.

Registration and Chaperones


- 1. All participants (directors, students, chaperones and guests) must be registered for the conference.
- 2. Only directors are to register their groups or pick up registration materials if preregistered.
- 3. All participating students must be chaperoned. At least one chaperone other than the director is required for every six students.
- 4. If the director does not accompany a participating student from that student's school, then the principal from that school must furnish a letter designating who is to be in charge of the student. The letter from the school should be addressed to the FMEA executive director and submitted with registration materials.
- 5. Student observers are not allowed to attend the conference. If any student observers are brought to the conference, the offending school's participation in the conference may be eliminated the following year.
- 6. All school music teachers must register for the conference as directors and be current members of FMEA.

Rehearsals and Name Badges

- 1. Name badges must be worn at all times by students, directors, guests and chaperones.
- Lost badges may be replaced at the registration desk by the director only, who must appear in person and pay the appropriate fee. The original registration receipt must be shown to obtain replacement badges.
- 3. Each component president is responsible for the policing of his or her groups and rehearsals.

This prestigious award honors individuals for outstanding contributions over an extended period of time to music and education in Florida as well as throughout the nation.

2017 Hall of Fame Inductee

Dr. Michael L. Allen



Dr. Michael L. Allen was a master teacher whose service to the Florida Music Education Association lives on in music programs throughout the state and nation. His vision and leadership continue to resonate with our organization to this day. He served for many years on the boards of the FMEA and the Florida Orchestra Association. Dr. Allen was an accomplished, committed leader who inspired others to achieve the FMEA mission of providing a comprehensive, quality music education for all Florida students.

Dr. Allen received a bachelor's degree from the Cleveland Institute of Music, a master's degree from Case Western Reserve University and the PhD in music education from the University of North Texas. He began his teaching career in the public schools of Spartanburg, South Carolina. Following a graduate fellowship from the University of North Texas, he served as string coordinator for the Denton Independent School District (Texas) for eight years. He was appointed to the Florida State University faculty in 1993. He also served as coordinator, director, and conductor of the FSU String Orchestra Camp.

Dr. Allen is perhaps best known for co-authoring *Essential Elements for Strings*. He was widely published and was also well-known as one of the major authors of *Teaching Music Through Performance in Orchestra*, Vol. 1-3. Additionally, he served as editor-in-chief of *Florida Music Director* as well as editor for the national publication *String Research Journal*. Dr. Allen received many awards and recognitions including the FMEA College Music Educator of the Year and a Citation for Leadership and Merit from the American String Teachers Association. He conducted honor orchestras throughout the United States and presented string workshops at all of the major music education conferences, both nationally and internationally.

Dr. Michael Allen also served his community as the director of the Tallahassee Youth Orchestra. In his five-year tenure with the organization, Dr. Allen brought a wealth of pedagogical knowledge to the program and expanded the infrastructure so that FSU string students not only served as coaches for the Senior Orchestra (symphony), but also performed with its members in a side-by-side fashion. In addition, Dr. Allen saw the need to create an ensemble that could easily travel throughout the community to perform in a variety of venues, and so he formed the Tallahassee Fiddlers.

Quite simply, Michael Allen was a master teacher. He was able to inspire people to become better teachers, musicians and human beings. Dr. Allen taught patience, kindness, love of teaching, love of music and integrity. He passed away in 2010, yet generations of teachers and students continue to be influenced by his lifelong work. Michael Allen was a loving husband and devoted father and is survived by his wife, Terice Diann Allen, and children Christopher Lee Allen and Matthew Kendall Allen. It is an honor for FMEA to recognize Dr. Michael L. Allen posthumously with its highest honor, induction into the FMEA Hall of Fame.

Music Educators of the Year

The FMEA Music Educator of the Year designation is awarded to the music educator who has served his/her students, community and profession in an exemplary manner. This award recognizes outstanding merit in music teaching. The recipient must have demonstrated notable achievement as a music education professional for 10 or more years.

Congratulations to 2017 Elementary Music Educator of the Year Anita Travaglino from Maniscalco Elementary School in Hillsborough County; nominated by Dorothy Trascritti on behalf of the Florida Elementary Music Educators Association.

A national board certified music teacher, Anita Travaglino began her career in 1995 in Florida. Currently the music teacher at Maniscalco Elementary

School in Lutz, Mrs. Travaglino holds the BS degree in music education from Ball State University. During her career she has built strong programs of musical excellence in vocal and instrumental music that have served as a model for her county and our state. Her handbell choirs have performed at the FMEA conference as well as at dozens of locations throughout the local

community, bringing joy to everyone they encounter. She has consistently had students selected to perform in the FMEA All-State Elementary Chorus and guides her own students to be budding composers in the Hillsborough County Young Songwriters Symposium. Anita has been selected to conduct multiple times for all-county chorus and honors handbell ensembles.

Passionate about providing a "high quality music education for all," Anita served as the executive director for the Florida Elementary Music Educators for 14 years. During her tenure, she played a critical role in developing the online adjudication training and scoring process for the All-State Elementary Chorus. She also played an integral part in the development of numerous important projects such as the Janice Lancaster Professional Development Scholarship, the All-State Orff Ensemble and FEMEA summer conferences, and finding ways to provide more money to schools through FEMEA grants. In 2002, Anita was named the Teacher of the Year at Cannella Elementary School and went on to be recognized as a finalist for Hillsborough County Teacher of the Year.



the MA in educational leadership from Troy State University in 2004. Mr. Bailey is an arts teacher's dream. When asked about the arts at Freedom High School, he stated, "We aim to develop the students academically, artistically and socially so that they leave the school as independent, cooperative, responsible and creative young adults with a lifelong interest and ability in learning and the arts. I believe that these skills and qualities will prepare our students to pursue further educational goals and allow them to contribute to the life and well-being of society as a whole." Mr. Bailey shows his support of the music program by his words, deeds and time.

Rolando Bailey became the principal of Freedom High School in 2013 and has led the school to being named a Top 100 High School in Florida. The school serves a diverse population of 3,600 students. This award recognizes leadership, excellence in encouragement and promotion of music education in Florida schools.

Congratulations to Nikolai P. Vitti, EdD, superintendent of Duval County Public Schools; nominated by April Laymon on behalf of FEMEA.

As superintendent of schools in Duval County since 2012, Dr. Nikolai Vitti has focused on reinvesting in arts education and strengthening comprehensive programs at all levels to ensure that every child in every school has



access to high-quality arts learning opportunities. He has made it clear that he is committed to leaving a lasting legacy of strong arts education programs in every school within Duval County Public Schools. Arts programs in Duval have made significant strides during his tenure, with increased funding, qualified arts personnel, support at every level and reestablishment of previously eliminated programs.





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
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
