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

Consider putting the following on your list of must-attend events:



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

native of Florida, Shawn Barat received the BME and the MM in instrumental conducting from the University of Florida. Mr. Barat has taught band in public schools and universities in Florida for 22 years, including successful positions at Ocala-Forest High School, Winter Haven High School, Douglas Anderson School of the Arts and the University of North Florida, where he served as adjunct professor of music and director of the Concert Band and the Osprey Pep Band. He is currently director of bands at Buchholz High School in Gainesville.

In 2013, Mr. Barat completed a seven-year tenure as director of bands at Douglas Anderson (DA) School of the Arts in Jacksonville. His teaching responsibilities at DA

included direction of the Wind Symphony, Symphonic Band, Percussion Ensemble and Chamber Ensembles, as well as teaching Advanced Placement Music Theory. Under Mr. Barat's direction, all ensembles consistently received superior ratings at district and state events. In addition, the DA Wind Symphony performed at the 2008 NAfME National Biennial In-Service Conference in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, the 2009 Florida Music Education Association Professional Development Conference in Tampa, the 2011 Music for All National Concert Band Festival in Indianapolis, Indiana, and the prestigious Midwest Clinic International Band and Orchestra



Conference in Chicago in December 2011. During Mr. Barat's time at DA, the Music Department was twice recognized as the National GRAMMY Signature School by the GRAMMY Foundation, first in 2010 and again in 2012.

Mr. Barat started a new chapter in his career as director of bands at Buchholz High School in spring 2015, returning to a band program he had spent countless hours working with during his time as a student at the University of Florida. At Buchholz, Mr. Barat directs the Golden Regiment Marching Band, Wind Symphony, Symphonic Band and Jazz Band, and teaches Advanced Placement

Music Theory. All ensembles have continued a long tradition of receiving superior ratings at district and state assessments. The Wind Symphony traveled to Washington, D.C., to perform at the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in April 2017.

Mr. Barat continues to be an active clinician and adjudicator for middle and high school bands throughout Florida, and is an involved member of several music organizations. He has served three terms as Florida Bandmasters Association district chairman, is chair of the FBA Ethics Committee and also serves as a representative on the Florida School Music Association Board of Directors. Additionally, Mr. Barat has served as guest conductor for all-state and

all-county bands, including the FBA All-State High School Honor Band and the FBA 9-Star Honor Band.

Mr. Barat's professional affiliations include the National Association for Music Education, the Florida Bandmasters Association, the National Band Association and Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia. Mr. Barat was elected to the Omega Chapter of Phi Beta Mu Bandmasters Fraternity in 2006, and was inducted into the prestigious American Bandmasters Association in 2014. He resides in Gainesville with his wife, Alison, an ESE teacher in the Alachua County schools, and daughters Emerson, 10, and Norah, 7.

an Schwindt teaches instru-▲mental music at Titusville High School, where he has served for the last 18 years. During his tenure, the program has doubled in size and has significantly expanded its musical offerings to include a full orchestra, AP Music Theory and an active chamber ensemble program. THS has been named a Music Demonstration School twice and a Model Arts School by the State of Florida and has earned the FMEA Music Enrollment Award. Titusville ensembles consistently earn superiors at MPAs and have performed on the FMEA President's Concert and the Stetson Invitational.

As a conductor and clinician,
Mr. Schwindt has served as conductor of the Brevard County

Youth Orchestra Symphony and is cur-

rently symphony director for the Creative Young Artists. He also conducts Melodies and Masterpieces each year and is active



as a clinician and adjudicator for both FBA and FOA across the state. He regularly conducts many select ensembles including the Florida State University Summer Music Camps and all-county groups statewide.

Mr. Schwindt serves in several school and district leadership positions including department chair, the Brevard County Music Leadership Team and the Brevard County Music Advisory Board. He was elected to serve two terms as FBA district chairman, was all-state chairman for six years and served as a board member of the FSMA state board for four years. He currently serves on the FMEA board and the FBA Music Committee.

Mr. Schwindt's awards include 2016-17 FMEA Secondary Music Educator of the Year, National Band Association Citation for Excellence, the FBA Oliver Hobbs Award, the FBA Tom Bishop

Award and Titusville High School Teacher of the Year. His professional affiliations include FMEA, FBA, FOA and Phi Beta Mu.

Refund Policies

- 1. Full registration refunds are available for cancellation requests made through Dec. 15, 2017.
- 2. No registration refunds will be made for cancellations made after Dec. 15, 2017, except for emergency situations. These will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis.
- 3. Refunds must be requested in writing (email is acceptable at **info@ flmusiced.org**).
- 4. All requests for refunds must be received no later than Jan. 31, 2018. Requests received after that date will not be processed.
- 5. All refunds are issued after the conference is completed.
- 6. There are no refunds for concert tickets.

Chaperone Registration

Chaperone registration is based on the following rules:

Elementary Students:

- For each elementary student registered, one free chaperone and one paid chaperone may be registered.
- Any additional attendees must purchase a guest pass at on-site registration for entry into the convention center.

Middle School and High School Students:

- For every six students registered, one free chaperone and one paid chaperone may be registered.
 No other chaperones may be registered until the seventh student is registered.
- Any additional attendees (chaperones or guests) must purchase a guest pass at on-site registration for entry into the convention center.

EXCEPTIONS:

- If you have students in more than one performing ensemble, you may pay for a chaperone for each performing ensemble in which you have registered students.
- If you have students from different schools, you may pay for a chaperone for each school for which you have registered students.



Registration Policies

- 1. All participants—directors, students, chaperones and guests—must be registered for the Professional Development Conference.
- 2. Only member directors may register their groups and pick up registration materials.
- 3. All participating students must be chaperoned. As required by FMEA, at least one chaperone, other than a director, is required for every ten (10) students or fraction thereof; however, FMEA policy allows for one free chaperone for every six (6) students or fraction thereof.
- 4. An additional paid chaperone may be registered for (a) each six (6) students registered or (b) for each all-state rehearsal site where registered students are performing.
- 5. If a participating student is not accompanied by the director from that student's school, then the principal from that school must furnish a letter designating the school or school district employee who is to be in charge of that student. The letter should be addressed and sent to the FMEA executive director, explaining the extenuating circumstances preventing the director from attending, no later than Dec. 15, 2017.
- 6. Student observers are not allowed to attend the Professional Development Conference unless they are registered for the Student Leadership Workshop and/or a Tri-M student registered and participating in sessions or working for the all-state concerts or Conference Experience students. If any student observers are brought to the conference, the offending school's participation in the Professional Development Conference may be eliminated the following year.
- 7. All school music teachers must register for the Professional Development Conference as FMEA members and be current members of FMEA. This includes directors of performing groups, including mini-concerts, and session presenters. All-state conductors from Florida schools, colleges or universities must also be FMEA members. No current music teacher may register as a chaperone.

All-State Ticket Policies

- Registered (BADGED) attendees do not require tickets to attend any all-state concert. This includes directors/ members, directors' non-teaching spouses, performing all-state students, registered chaperones, collegiate student members, retired members and VIP guests that you entered as part of your conference registration.
- 2. All nonregistered (NONBADGED) attendees (parents, family members, guests, etc.) are required to purchase tickets for any all-state concert they wish to attend at \$10 per ticket.
- 3. There are no "free" or "allotted" tickets. All concert attendees must either wear their conference badge or purchase a ticket.
- 4. A director who preregisters online may reserve and prepay for all-state concert tickets for nonregistered attendees for concerts in which he or she has registered all-state students. If paid for online, these tickets will be preloaded into the director's registration package.
- A director who registers on site may purchase all-state concert tickets for nonregistered attendees for concerts in which he or she has registered all-state students during the on-site registration process.
- 6. A director with all-state students may purchase additional concert tickets for nonregistered attendees for concerts in which he or she has performing students at the conference on-site registration desk or at a designated ticket sales location at any time.
- 7. General ticket sales for all-state concerts will begin at 11 am on Thursday at the FMEA registration desk. There is no requirement that the director or any other registered attendee be the person to purchase tickets after this time.
- 8. All ticket sales are final. There will be no refunds for any concert tickets.
- 9. For entrance, ticketing and concert purposes, a concert is defined as the pair of ensembles that are performing in the same venue in a common, defined block of time. An example of a "concert" for purposes of entrance, ticketing, etc., is the 6 pm concert on Friday for the All-State Reading Chorus and the All-State Men's Chorus.

Code of Conduct

Student Curfew

- 1. Curfew for students on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights is from 11 pm until 6 am. Curfew for students on Saturday night begins at 11 pm or one hour after the end of the concert and lasts until 6 am. Curfew means that students must be in their rooms and remain there during the hours stated.
- 2. Thirty (30) minutes after curfew, students not in their assigned rooms will be subject to withdrawal. If curfew is violated, members from the violator(s)' school component group will not be accepted for participation in the professional development conference the following year.

Student Conduct

- Students in hotel rooms must remain reasonably quiet at all times, both day and night. People in neighboring rooms who are not connected with the conference may be trying to sleep. Television and radio may be played only with volume at low level.
- 2. Hotel rooms are bedrooms. Under no circumstances should students visit or entertain others of the opposite sex in their hotel rooms.
- Hotel room doors should be locked at all times. Extreme care should be exercised near hotel windows, and nothing is to be thrown from windows. Students are not allowed on hotel roofs.
- Chaperones should have all rooms checked before leaving hotels so that damages, if any, can be determined immediately.
- Students are not to visit students in other hotels without the permission of a chaperone. Students are not allowed in cars except with chaperones.
- No alcoholic beverage may be in students' possession at any time.
- 7. Illegal use of drugs in any form is absolutely prohibited.
- Use of tobacco products in public by students is prohibited.
- Students should engage in activities of a group nature only. Under no circumstances are social dates involving students allowed.
- 10. Students should wear appropriate clothing, including shoes, at all times.

Registration and Chaperones

- 1. All participants (directors, students, chaperones and guests) must be registered for the conference.
- 2. Only directors are to register their groups and pick up registration materials.
- 3. All participating students must be chaperoned. At least one chaperone other than the director is required for every six students.
- 4. If the director does not accompany a participating student from that student's school, then the principal from that school must furnish a letter designating who is to be in charge of the student. The letter from the school should be addressed to the FMEA executive director and submitted with registration materials.
- 5. Student observers are not allowed to attend the conference. If any student observers are brought to the conference, the offending school's participation in the conference may be eliminated the following year. (TRI-M students and Conference Experience students registered and participating in sessions or working for the all-state concerts are exempt from this rule.)
- 6. All school music teachers must register for the conference as directors and be current members of FMEA. This includes directors of invited performing groups, mini-concerts and session presenters. All-state conductors from Florida schools, colleges or universities must also be FMEA members. No current music teacher may register as a chaperone.

Rehearsals and Name Badges

- 1. Name badges must be worn at all times by students, directors, guests and chaperones.
- Lost badges may be replaced at the registration desk by the director only, who must appear in person and pay the appropriate fee. The original registration receipt must be shown to obtain replacement badges.
- 3. Each component president is responsible for the policing of his or her groups and rehearsals.

2018 Hall of Fame Inductee

Alice-Ann Darrow, PhD

This prestigious award honors individuals for outstanding contributions over an extended period of time to music and education in Florida, as well as throughout the nation.

Alice-Ann Darrow is the Irvin Cooper professor of music education and music therapy at Florida State University. Prior to her appointment at FSU, she taught in the Dade County Schools and at The University of Kansas. During her time at KU, she worked weekly with students at the Kansas School for the Deaf and was founding director of Song, Sign and Mime, a sign language performance troupe. At FSU, she organizes a general music learning lab for young children.

Her teaching and research interests include teaching music to special populations, inclusive practices for students with disabilities, particularly those with behavior disorders or who are deaf/hard-of-hearing, and the role of nonverbal communication in the music class-

room. Related to these topics, she has been the recipient of more than 20 federal, university or corporate grants.

Dr. Darrow is co-author of *Music in Special Education*, editor of the text *Introduction to Approaches in Music Therapy* and co-author of *Music in Special Education* and *Music Therapy With Geriatric Populations: A Handbook for Practicing Music Therapists and Healthcare Professionals*.

She has published more than 100 journal articles related to music education and music therapy, as well as numerous book chapters, with recent chapters included in *The Oxford Handbook of Music Education, The Oxford Handbook on Social Justice in Music Education* and *The Oxford Handbook on Approaches to Teaching General Music.* She has presented her work in Canada, Greece, Japan, Korea, Norway, Spain, Malaysia, Italy, China, Brazil, Cypress, Finland, Ireland and Scotland.

Dr. Darrow has served on the editorial boards for major journals in music education and music therapy. She is past chair of the



Society for Research in Music Education and the Commission on Music in Special Education for the International Society for Music Education. She presently serves as FMEA chairwoman for diverse learners and recently served on the NAfME task force for the inclusion of students with disabilities and as coeditor for an MEI special focus issue on students with disabilities. Committed to diversity and inclusion, she has served on boards for various organizations that serve persons with disabilities, has organized musical performances at a local homeless shelter and has directed the intergenerational ensemble Rock of Ages. As a young professional, she was a Big Sister with Big Brothers and Sisters, a child advocate for Volunteers in Court

and taught music classes at South Dade Federal Prison and at community centers for disadvantaged youth and for adults with developmental disabilities.

Dr. Darrow is the recipient of the Ella Scoble Opperman Citation for Distinguished Achievement from the FSU College of Music, FSU's Guardian of the Flame Award, national research and clinical practice awards from the American Music Therapy Association, FMEA's Collegiate Music Educator of the Year, community service awards from the Alzheimer's Project and Independence, Inc., distinguished member in Sigma Alpha Iota, KU's Silver Anniversary Teaching Award, an intra-university professorship in special education and hearing science and membership in the KU Women's Hall of Fame.

She received the BM, BME, MM and PhD degrees at Florida State University and taught in music programs for students with and without disabilities in Miami, Florida, before going to the University of Kansas.

This award recognizes leadership, excellence in encouragement and promotion of music education in Florida schools.




Congratulations to **Dr. Kamela Patton**, superintendent of Collier County Public Schools; nominated by Skip Pardee.

Entering her seventh year of leading the Collier County Public Schools, Dr. Kamela Patton has raised the district to national acclaim

in many areas, all while focusing district resources to support arts education specifically. Her 29-year career in education has been consistently student and teacher centered, and among her priorities for educating the whole child are the arts. Under her leadership, in the 2016-17 school year, the district has transitioned from STEM to STEAM, thanks to her visionary leadership and support. In fact, the Collier County Public School Strategic Plan for 2017-19 includes the A for the arts in its STEAM initiative, and training for the teachers is a part of that. Among the accomplishments under her watch, the school district entered into a Kennedy Center Partnership with Artis-Naples, which provided district staff with authentic arts integration professional development. Dr. Patton has put an emphasis on expanding music programs in the Immokalee area of her district, a formerly underserved area. During her tenure, she has enabled more collaboration between community groups and the school system. With her leadership, Collier County students have extended learning opportunities in the arts. The Naples Music Club has increased its school outreach from one program to five. The MusicScores! Pre-K Literacy/Violin program is now in all 20 Headstart classrooms. Dr. Patton is not just behind the scenes of the quality music making happening in Collier County. It takes much courage to accept such an ongoing responsibility and to commit the necessary time and energy throughout the entire year. Yet Dr. Joel Pagan did it with open arms for years. Joel managed to do this incredible work for FMEA while maintaining a demanding schedule as a band director and then as a doctoral student. He did amazing work on FMEA's most significant activity, and he has had a direct impact on our entire membership. For this, he is deserving of the 2018 FMEA Distinguished Service Award.

Exemplary Model Program/Project

The Exemplary Model Program/Project designation is awarded to an individual or groups for meritorious, exemplary or innovative programs or projects completed in the field of music education. Projects may include exemplary model and/or innovative music education programs or projects that provide or continue to provide a significant, positive impact on students, music educators and/or the state/community.

Congratulations to **Jessica Fredricks** for Rhythm Revolution: DRUMBEAT; nominated by Leigh Ann King.

Rhythm Revolution: DRUMBEAT® is a structured learning program using the medium of music and hand drumming to engage students, to lift their self-confidence and to teach a range of life skills. This program is evidence based and outcome oriented. Over the 10-week program, students practice social skills such as problem solving, active listening, leadership, empathy and tolerance by making music. Their learning is extended through discussion that promotes self-reflection and awareness on how their thoughts, feelings and actions impact their relationships with others. At the end of the program, students create a unique piece of music and perform to an audience to



showcase their skills. What is exemplary about this project is its massive scale—270 students last year and 875 students this year! In 2014, Polk County Fine Arts Coach Jessica Fredricks trained to become an accredited DRUMBEAT facilitator and implemented the protocol at Combee Elementary. Jessica witnessed transformational change in the children. Based on the success that Ms. Fredricks was seeing, by 2016 the district had hosted its first DRUMBEAT training session, which enabled 20 educational professionals (including music teachers, teachers, social workers, psychologists, administrators and principals) to be trained as DRUMBEAT facilitators. After much grant writing, 83 drums were secured to implement the program. Data was collected on the students who participated. In the first year, there was a 50 percent reduction in discipline referrals and a 30 percent increase in attendance by students in the program. As of today, 75 people have been trained to facilitate DRUMBEAT across Polk County, ensuring a confident and highly capable team of professionals. The DRUMBEAT program has started a Rhythm Revolution in Polk County—creating a fun and energetic environment in which students take control of their own behavior while at the same time improving their social and emotional learning.

This award recognizes the outstanding service of our members who have committed themselves to this profession for most of their adult lives. 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
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Middle/High School Music Enrollment Awards

Schools hold the award for three years. They may be looked to as models of quality programming, scheduling, recruitment and retention of students. In order to qualify for this award, at least 35 percent at the high school level and 45 percent at the middle school level of the entire student body must be enrolled in a music course. 

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
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
